



SATELLITE OFFICE


Our office can help navigate all things city government, submit and

SOUTH SIDE PARKING ENHANCEMENT DISTRICT (PED)

The South Side PED is a parking zone on East Carson Street that allows the Pittsburgh Parking Authority to collect and deposit revenue into a trust fund, returning money to the community by paying for:



PUBLIC SAFETY - CITY OF PITTSBURGH BUREAU OF POLICE (ZONE 3)

Commander Abraham of Zone 3 police shared their statistics that the Telephone Reporting Unit (TRU) answered 2,000+ calls for service, which allowed Zone 3 officers to attend 70+ community engagements, 547 neighborhood patrols, and over 1,700 traffic stops. In 2024, the number of gang-related/robbery homicides went from 9 to 5 in. We went from 8 shootings in the South Side to 2.

In 2023, 54 firearms were seized. In 2024, 105, with 60 of them in the South Side! In shots-fired calls for the South Side, we had 53 shots fired calls/activations in 2024, compared to 88 in 2023. Zone wide saw a 9% decrease in shots-fired calls.

We also want to give a huge shoutout to the South Side Entertainment Patrol, a dedicated team of 10 officers who patrol East Carson Street and keep the neighborhood safe by working with the bars/restaurants on East Carson Street.

GARBAGE OLYMPICS

District 3 cleans up and earns gold, silver, bronze in City-wide litter clean-up competition. The Mt. Oliver City/ St. Clair team of 40 volunteers, led by Jamie Pierson, took home the gold for collecting the most trash in the <u>Garbage Olympics</u>! Allentown

placed 2nd and won for finding the strangest item - an evil Santa nutcracker. South Side Flats won 3rd and had the most volunteers of any team: 86!

Across District 3, 239+ volunteers filled 492 bags of trash and collected 248 tires, 130 TVs, and more than 818 bulk items in only 2 hours. Thank you to all the 2024 Garbage Olympics team captains, neighbors and volunteers, the <u>Clean Pittsburgh Commission</u>, Velum Fermentation, and our Department of Public Works for pulling off this great event. Looking forward to September 2025 for year 9!

POST AGENDA ON ZONING REFORM

In March, we hosted National Land Use Expert Nolan Gray, author of Arbitrary Lines: How Zoning Broke the American City and How to Fix It, to Pittsburgh for a Post Agenda discussion on zoning reforms that impact housing supply. This experience helped shape the zoning reforms we introduced later in the year and underscored the need build abundant housing of all types in Pittsburgh. We have a lot to learn from other cities where housing has become unaffordable.

SOUTH SIDE BUSINESS DISTRICT MANAGER AND THANK YOUS

The historic Carson Street business district, though vibrant and eclec tic, currently has a 26% vacant storefront rate. Our office worked with the Pittsburgh Downtown Partnership, South Side Community Council, South Side Hospitality Partnership, the Urban Redevelopment Authority, South Side Chamber of Commerce, and State Repre sentative Jess Benham to hire a business district manager to attract, support, and retain businesses along the Carson Street corridor. The new business district manager, Susan Anderson, started in January and we are so excited to see and support her work!

Thank you to all working to revitalize our shopping and entertainment district, with special shout-out to Ed John and Don Berman for their leadership! And thank you to our funders, the Hillman Family Foundations and UPMC for making this a reality!
