WHAT IS THE SAFE PASSAGE SAFETY MODEL?

INTERRUPTING THE TRANSMISSION OF THE DISEASE OF VIOLENCE BY CHANGING CULTURAL NORMS

PILLAR 1: DETECT AND INTERRUPT

- Communicate any potential conflicts within the school community
- Attempt to mediate any known conflicts within the school community
- Identify and communicate any social media content that would increase the risk level within the school community



PILLAR 2: IDENTIFY AND TREAT HIGH RISK INDIVIDUALS



- Connect the students with services and resources from the community
- Mentor and develop relationships to get a desired change in behavior from some of the highest at-risk individuals in the community
- Provide activities outside of school hours

PILLAR 3: CHANGE COMMUNITY NORMS

- Reduce the number of students involved when fights occur in the school community
- Change the community norm of recording fights to post on social media
- Spread positive messages and norms within the school community



PILLAR 4: PROVIDE IDENTITIES



- Support and promote activities and organizations that create identities inside or outside of the school community
- Promote school sports, activities, and events
- Promote after school clubs and activities
- Promote trade programs, technology, and career resources
- Connect students with identities that are known to produce good outcomes

SAFE PASSAGE OVERVIEW

Safe Passage is an anti-violence program run through a partnership between Operation Better Block, the City of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh Public Schools, and BUHL.

Using a public health approach, our goal is to reduce the transmission of the disease of violence among Pittsburgh Public Schools students and their communities.

Originally piloted at Perry in 2021, the program is currently being implemented at seven Pittsburgh Public Schools.

This is done through training our Safe Passage Coordinators and Youth Safety Ambassadors with the Safe Passage Safety Model. Collectively, they serve as violence interrupters and identify at-risk youth to help them join the peace-keeping solution. School communities are also connected to resources ranging from financial support to job searches.

OUR WORK

Violence Interruption

Safety Ambassadors and Safe Passage Coordinators are trained to detect, interrupt, and treat violence when it occurs in their school or is at risk of occurring. Their response is dependent upon the determined level of severity.

School-Based Programming

Safe Passage Coordinators create programs based on the needs of their school community to teach Safety Ambassadors life skills to support their personal, academic, and professional growth.

All programs are created in alignment with the Safe Passage Safety Model. Some programs include Creating Peace, Tea Time, and Wealth is a Mindset.

Safe Space Community Events

Safe Passage hosts community events to support fun, violence free activities and identity building.

Community resources are housed and sent through NewEra412.com
